

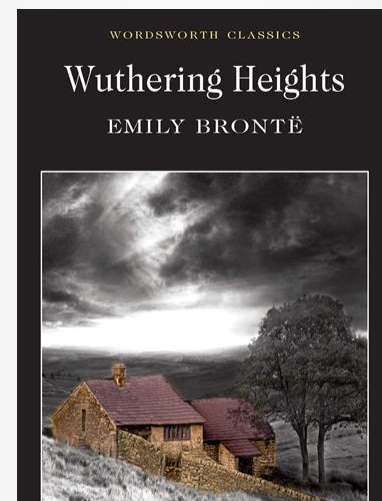
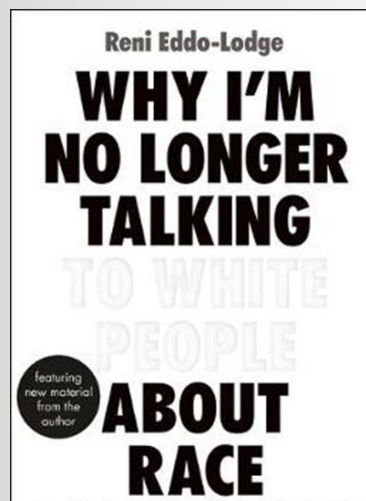
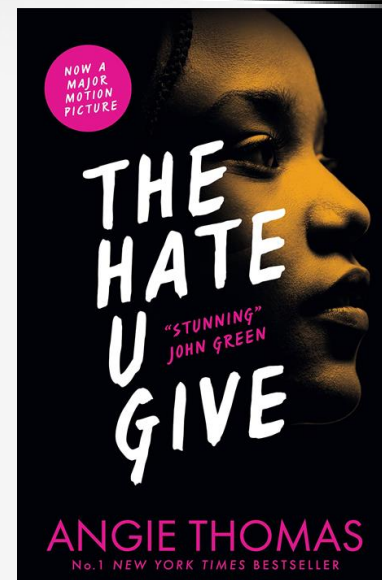
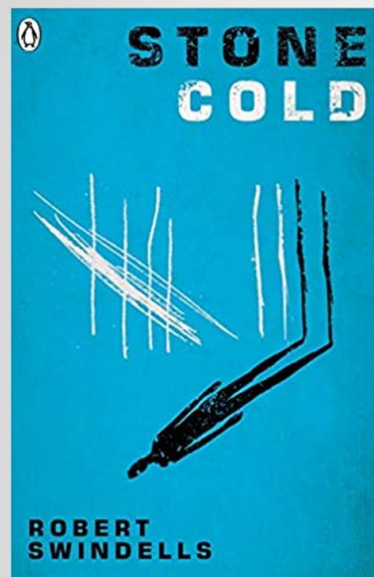
## Additional Reading in English

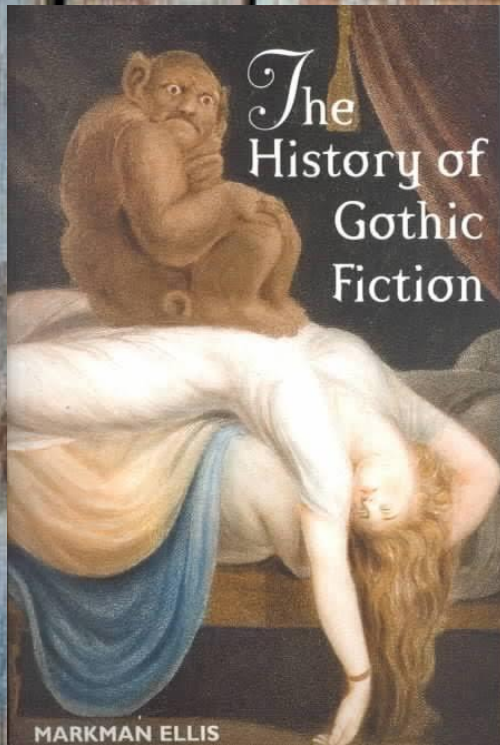
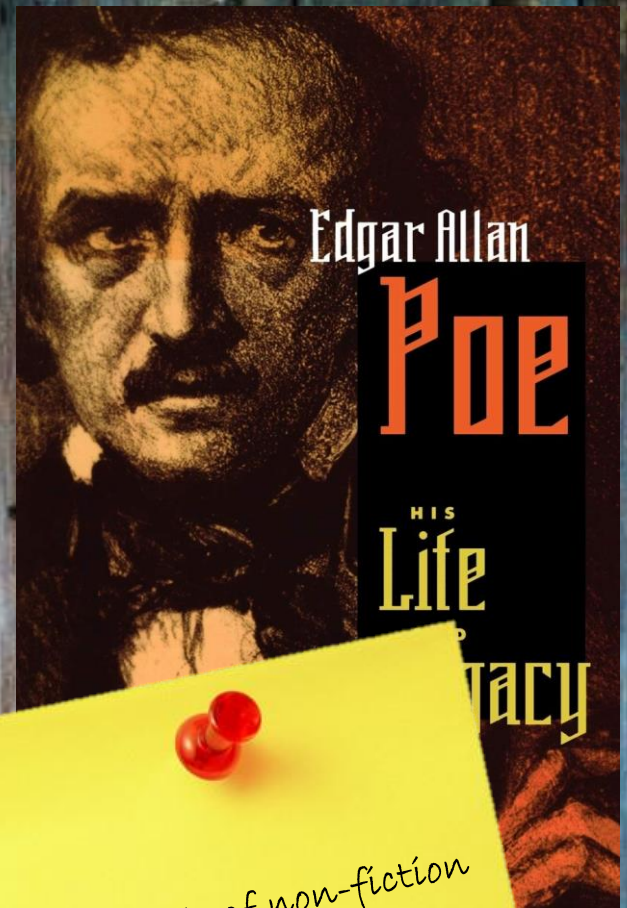
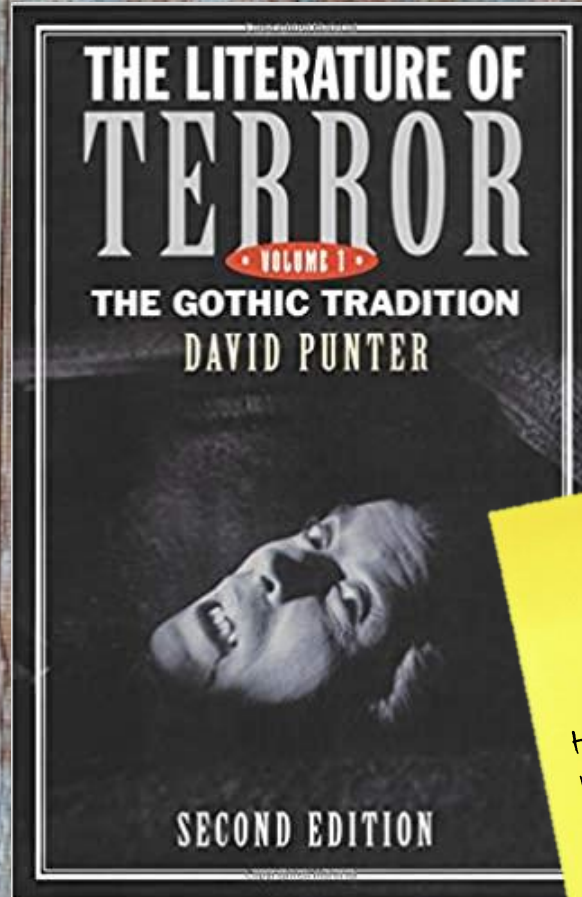
Some of the books will provide extra reading on a topic, theme, genre or author. Others may allow you to explore sub-genres or similar authors to the ones you have been studying in class.

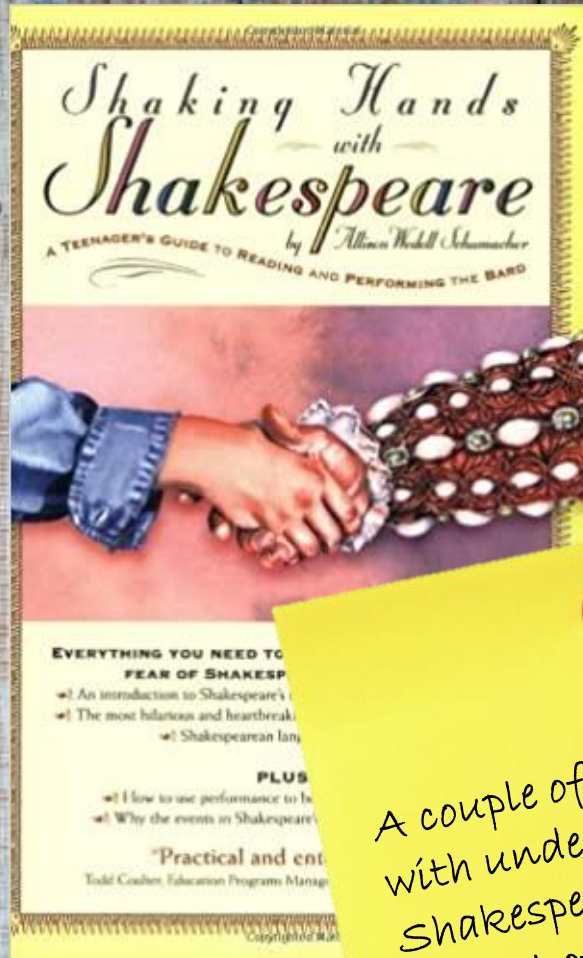
Here's some informative and interesting non-fiction books. Including true stories about events that have featured in the media.
