EXPLORING AND RESEARCHING ARTISTS A01

Success criteria:

- You will research one artist (I will provide you with a list)
- They will be of your choice, interested in and link to your topic.
- You will present pages on these artists, images of their work and write about their work and background.
- You will explain how the artists link to your topic, like the theme, style or techniques because they are interesting and want to apply them in your work.
- You will include images and draw examples of their work.
- You will use the knowledge organiser on artist research to help you.

ARTIST NAME & DOB (HIGHER)

Artists background: Research basic background of the artist. Who is the artist? When were they born/die and where did he/she come from? Is the artists part of an art movement? What is the art movement about? How does the artist relate to the project?

Visual Description: What does it look like? Is it a picture, sculpture, installation or performance? What is in the artwork? What is the foreground and background? Is the image realistic, distorted (changed), abstracted or simplified? What is the style?

Materials: What materials has the artist used to make this piece of work? How? What has the artists worked from to produce their idea?

Visual Description: What visual elements and objects are used in the piece? How is the work organised? What are the devices applied? Can you illustrate a visual example. How does it lead your eye around the work? Where is the main focus point? Where is it weighted? Why do you think this...? Which objects seems closer to you? Further away? Is the artwork busy and complicated or simple in design? How? Can you describe the colours the artist has used? What colour is used the most in this artwork?

Emotional: Does the piece make you feel in a particular way? Describe why or how it makes you feel? How does the composition/colour/tone etc exaggerate the feeling/ mood of the piece? Can you describe how the artist has applied them? E.G: Descriptively, emotionally. What effect do they create.


